Do You Know This Soldier?



This image is from the **Carlson Studio collection** of negatives and photos recently donated by Darlene Johnson. Thank you Darlene for sharing your wonderful collection with us and future generations! There are hundreds of negatives, many glass, many 5x7's, and some of the extra long ones. Darlene and the MCHS Board have agreed that the WIU Archives is best equipped to preserve and display to a wider audience those negatives that it deems of general interest. At WIU, archivists are presently sorting through a multitude of negatives and some prints. This will take quite some time, but eventually, per our partnership agreement, WIU will provide us with high-quality digital images of the prints and negatives they keep and store. Those not of general interest, e.g. unidentified people and places, will be returned to the Essley-Noble Museum.

Currently at the museum is the above color photo of an unknown, presumable WWI Medic, as well as a few charming photos of unlabeled family members. We are hoping that someone will recognize these people and help identify them. One wonders if this young man survived the war and hopefully lived to enjoy great-grandchildren.

At the museum, and among items not being digitized by WIU are boxes of 5x7" negatives from area schools showing individual and group images. Included are Aledo H.S. 1930-37, 1941-47, 1949-51, 1954-55; Ipava 1940-41; Keithsburg and Little York 1946; New Windsor Lutheran (?); Seaton 1939, 40, 42-45; and Woodhull 1940. Also the RMA 1933-35, 43-44. The people are not identified, but the negatives may be viewed by placing them on a light box. Also, a low-quality positive image can be captured by our scanner.

The museum has yearbooks to help identify many of the people from the years above, but missing are the complete Seaton and Ipava series; Keithsburg 1944, 46, 49; New Windsor Lutheran 1941; and RMA 1944. Donations of these yearbooks would be greatly appreciated, or even a loan in order to copy pages that could help identify people in the negatives.

More Reasons to Visit

The Essley Noble Museum opens for the 2006 season on Saturday, April 1. The hours remain the same: Saturday, Sunday, and Wednesday afternoons from 1 to 5:00 P.M. If a group would like to visit at another time, please call during open hours or 584-4820 or contact any board member. There is no charge although we welcome any kettle donations.

Recent artifacts have included laboratory equipment from the Aledo High School. One item was a cut-away of a steam engine showing how the gear valve works. If you have a catalog or book showing his item with the description, please contact me at 584-4820. I saw it in a display last year so know an advertisement of explanation exists.

Fifth Grade Tours

Shirley Ball, Harriett Reynolds, and Alyce Robinson are busily planning the annual 5th grade tours. This is an informative and very enjoyable event for the youth to appreciate the lives of our ancestors. They experience hands-on activities such as rope making, quilting, blanket tying, washing clothes, and shelling corn, as well as touring the machine shed and museum and experiencing a session in the one-room school house.

Tours are at the museum after lunch on May 5, Westmer; May 8 & 9, Sherrard and May 10 (AM), Aledo. These are fun for everyone involved and **volunteers are needed!** No experience is necessary, free on the job training! The Essley Noble Museum, machine shed, and school house are ready to welcome a new season of visitors. Before entering, note the new **flagpole** purchased with funds from the Marvin "Bus" McWhorter estate. To the right of the entrance read the inscription on the **Millersburg Church cornerstone**, donated by James Earl.

Inside, check our display cases of many common and lesser-known **birds**. Three cases of birds were donated by the Eugene Parkman family. Eugene (1863-1929) ran a general store and was a member of the city council for 27 years. During his lifetime he accumulated an extensive collection of birds. Another case was originally given to the Aledo school district by Mr. Joseph W. McRoberts. The displays have recently been cleaned and labeled and the birds secured on their perches.



The **railroad exhibit** donated by John Hagrelius, Monmouth, has been moved to "The Story of Mercer County" section. It has been modified to tell of the railroads coming to, and impact on, the county. The American Central arrived in Mercer County in 1869, bisecting the county east-west. Over some local objections, the line was leased to the CB&Q, a branch coming from Rio, through North Henderson, and on to Monmouth. The Rock Island Southern was an extension of the Rock Island and Mercer County Railroad. The latter ran to Reynolds, Preemption, Sherrard, and Cable to transport coal miners. The RIS extended southward, connecting Matherville, Gilchrist, Burgess, Monmouth, and Galesburg. Spurs were built to Aledo and Alexis.

A small diorama depicts the role of religion in Mercer County's development. A **model of the Pope's River (Presbyterian) Church** made by Teresa Sloan, an 8th grade social Studies student, is featured. This exhibit responds to the final statement on the pioneer cabin, "They brought their religion with them—the bible for personal use, communal worship as soon as congregation could be formed."

New to our digital collection are photos documenting the construction of the **Aledo Post Office**. Also we are processing a collection from the **Carlson Studio** (See previous article.). Remember

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to check the progression of **native prairie** plants on the south side of the main building.

With each visit you will enjoy old exhibits as well as discover many items not previously noticed. Bring friends and family, our jewel of a museum is a "must see" for out-of-town guests. Welcome!

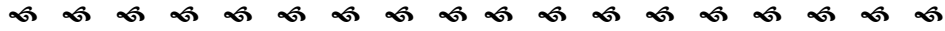


A PASSING OF NOTE

A bit of U.S. history recently passed here in Mercer County. A.J. "Skim" Gerard who spent his life in New Boston and Aledo died Feb. 8, 2006. He was the last Mercer County resident who survived the Japanese surprise attack on Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941, being aboard the USS Honolulu. "Skim" was also aboard ship off the USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay when Japan surrendered Sep. 2, 1945. "Skim" married Betty Simpkins who survives him as do two daughters, grandchildren and great grandchildren.
